RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Mateo, State of California, that

WHEREAS, in 2007 the Association of Bay Area Governments requested nominations from local governments and land conservation organizations for Priority Conservation Areas pursuant to the “Focusing our Vision” multi-agency regional planning initiative; and

WHEREAS, in 2007 the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors approved nomination of the San Mateo County Office of Education Priority Conservation Area, which led to grant funding and the County’s acquisition of the Loma Mar Redwoods property on January 28, 2014 as an addition to Memorial County Park; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Association of Bay Area Governments requested nominations from local governments and special districts for Priority Conservation Areas pursuant to the Plan Bay Area multi-agency regional planning initiative; and

WHEREAS, Priority Conservation Areas are areas of regional significance which contain important agricultural, natural resource, watershed, historic, scenic, cultural, recreational, and/or ecological values and ecosystem functions deserving of

conservation funding; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the County's four nominations, the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District submitted six Priority Conservation Area nominations; and

WHEREAS, the ten Priority Conservation Areas that have been nominated in 2015 are mutually compatible, and complimentary, and represent a diverse and balanced mix of conservation principles in San Mateo County; and

WHEREAS, the proposed designation of Priority Conservation Areas conforms to the County General Plan, specifically with respect to the Vegetative, Water, Fish and Wildlife Resources, Soil Resources, Park and Recreation, Water Supply, and Climate Change Policies of the General Plan; and

WHEREAS, the proposed designation of Priority Conservation Areas conforms to the County Local Coastal Program, specifically with respect to the Recreation/Visitor Serving Components of the Local Coastal Program.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors hereby endorses the following ten Priority Conservation Areas as listed below and described and mapped as attached:


1. Miramontes Ridge: Regional Recreation, Natural Landscapes, Agricultural Lands

6. South Skyline: Regional Recreation, Natural Landscapes, Agricultural Lands

8. Pedro Point Headlands: Regional Recreation, Natural Landscapes

WHEREAS, the Association of Bay Area Governments is requesting nominations from local governments and special districts for Priority Conservation Areas (PCA) as part of the Plan Bay Area Implementation effort; and

WHEREAS, PCAs are intended to be areas which contain important agricultural, natural resource, watershed, historic, scenic, cultural, recreational, and/or ecological values and ecosystem functions deserving of conservation funding; and

WHEREAS, the 2014 PCA program update specifically addresses the Open Space and Farmland implementation areas and introduces four categories to recognize the role of different kinds of PCAs in supporting the vitality of the region's natural systems, rural economy and human health; and

WHEREAS, the proposed Priority Conservation Areas covers approximately 1,508 acres of lands owned and managed by MROSD located within the Town of Portola Valley and its sphere of influence; and





On behalf of the City of Saratoga, I am writing to express our support for the portion of the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District (MROSD)'s Saratoga to the Sea Priority Conservation Area (PCA) that is located within Saratoga's Sphere of Influence in Santa Clara County.

The City of Saratoga Open Space/Conservation Element includes the following adopted goals and policies which relate directly to this proposal:

Goal OSC 3:

To provide and maintain parks and a variety of passive and active recreational sites which are located, designed, and improved to serve the needs of the residents, the community, and the neighborhoods of Saratoga.

Policy OSC 3.1:

Ensure that existing and future parks and dedicated open spaces remain part of the public domain in perpetuity.

Policy OSC 3.3:

Promote retention and dedication of land which provides room for a variety of passive and active recreational pursuits and offers important opportunities for the fulfillment of human and psychological needs, including:

- 1. Areas of outstanding scenic value.*
- 2. Areas of historic and cultural value.*
- 3. Accessible areas particularly suited for parks and recreation purposes such as hiking, horseback riding, biking, swimming, tennis, ball fields and more.*
- 4. Areas providing access to and links between major recreation, cultural and open space reservations, including trails, utility easements, banks of rivers and streams and scenic highway corridors.*
- 5. Areas with inherent qualities that humans find visually pleasing, beautiful, relaxing, stimulating or enjoyable.*

Goal OSC 6:

Preserve the hillside lands in their natural condition and inherent natural beauty.

Policy OSC 6.2:

Public use and enjoyment of the unincorporated hillside areas for recreational purposes shall be encouraged through direct or indirect public land acquisition, encouraging both private and public recreational uses. Appropriate regulation of privately held lands to obtain maximum use of open space resources, such as the establishment of trail and open space easements, should be consistent with conservation of the natural environment.

Through MROSD's extensive outreach with local jurisdictions and partner agencies, MROSD's PCA nominations are based on broad consensus, the latest conservation science and data, and input from their collaboration with numerous other agencies, partners, and jurisdictions. The benefits of these proposed PCAs include recognizing regionally significant open space areas with high conservation, agricultural, and recreational values. The proposed Saratoga to Sea PCA includes these benefits and is consistent with the City of Saratoga's General Plan Open Space and Conservation element.

For the protection of the Bay Area's greenbelt and continued quality of life we all enjoy, the City urges the ABAG Executive Board to approve MROSD's PCA nomination for the Saratoga to Sea PCA.



RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF WOODSIDE SUPPORTING THE PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREA DESIGNATION OF TEAGUE HILL, OWNED BY THE MIDPENINSULA REGIONAL OPEN SPACE DISTRICT, WITHIN THE TOWN OF WOODSIDE

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) requested nominations from local governments and land conservation organizations for Priority Conservation Areas (PCA's) pursuant to the "Plan Bay Area" multi-agency regional planning initiative; and

WHEREAS, PCA's are intended to be areas which contain important agricultural, natural resource, natural landscape, watershed, historic, scenic, cultural, recreational, and/or ecological values and ecosystem functions deserving of conservation funding; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District (Midpeninsula) began the nomination process for Teague Hill, in conjunction with neighboring Huddart and Wunderlich County Parks, as a PCA; and

WHEREAS, in 2014 and 2015, Midpeninsula conducted outreach to the Town of Woodside and County of San Mateo staff, and received support from both the Town and the County to act as the lead agency in this nomination; and

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2015, Midpeninsula conducted outreach to the Town of Woodside Open Space Committee, and received unanimous support for this nomination; and

WHEREAS, designation of Teague Hill as a PCA in the categories of "Natural Landscapes" and "Regional Recreation" is consistent with Woodside's General Plan and zoning designations of the property as Open Space for the Preservation of Natural Resources; and

WHEREAS, specific funding sources may favor PCA's, which would position Teague Hill for conservation and/or trail building funds; and

WHEREAS, the PCA designation does not result in any loss in local land use control; and

WHEREAS, designation of Teague Hill, along with Huddart and Wunderlich Parks, positions these lands more strategically for conservation efforts.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED that the Town Council of the Town of Woodside does hereby endorse Teague Hill as a Priority Conservation Area, as described on the attached map (Exhibit A).




