The national economic crisis and the state's budget debacle are creating havoc for local governments across the state at a level unseen since Proposition 13. The melt down on Wall Street has resulted in investment losses in the billions for the state, primarily PERS and other retirement systems, including

cities and counties not in PERS. Employees' 401(K) plans have lost more than thirty percent (30%) of their value in the last twelve months. The mortgage crisis is not over, foreclosures continue in many counties in record numbers, and the impact on property tax revenues has been devastating for some. The state is now estimating its deficit at \$40 billion over the next 18 months. There is a real possibility the state will turn to local governments to borrow, shift revenues that will reduce support for local programs and services, and make huge budget cuts. This borrowing and shifting of revenues will require local governments to operate programs with greatly reduced funding. Many local governments have already taken on the difficult task of raising fees, persuading residents to increase taxes, and making draconian reductions in staffing and services. The state has done virtually none of this to date.

ABAG's programs and services are impacted by what happens at the state level. Only six percent (6%) of ABAG's revenues are from membership dues. Most of the revenues are from state and federal grants and contracts and a variety of restricted enterprise funds operated by the agency. The state has suspended funding for a number of our programs and they will likely stay suspended until there is a resolution of the budget crisis. Since most of the state funding is from restricted funds (mainly voter approved bonds and other restricted sources), we hope that once the budget is resolved the suspensions will be lifted and the funds for our programs will be released, since these funds are not available for general fund purposes. There is still anxiety around this since the state has shown willingness in the past to shift restricted funds to support state programs that are arguably eligible for these funds.

We are recommending that the Board reaffirm the previous decision made at the General Assembly to increase membership dues equal to the CPI for the Bay Area, which is 3.6%.

While the economic crisis has consumed a lot of time and energy in the past months, many constructive and positive developments occurred during this last year. Two key areas of our FOCUS initiative, Primary Development Areas (PDAs) and Priority Conservation Areas (PCAs), have been enthusiastically received by a large number of jurisdictions. We have approved 106 PDAs and 98 PCAs. In the second round of PDAs solicitation, 20 applications have been received and are currently under review. We are working with our regional partners, principally the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, to secure funding for the planning of these areas. We have completed the first draft of Projections 2009 and hope to have the final completed in the early spring.

The San Francisco Estuary Project recently received \$5 million from the Environmental Protection Agency to carry out a number of programs around the Bay. The Bay Trail Project has completed over 300 miles of the 500 mile trail plan. The Green Business Program continues to be very successful and is rapidly expanding. Our service programs continue to provide needed services to members and their constituents: the energy watch program and gas purchase program, financial services (bond financing for housing, hospitals, schools, senior care facilities), and our liability insurance program.

Notwithstanding the economic challenges we face, ABAG and its regional partners are planning to position the Bay Area to be successful in its regional sustainability efforts in implementing SB 375, AB 32, and MTC's Regional Transportation Plan. The commitment to these objectives on the part of our leaders is solid and the staffs of our various agencies are creative, talented, and dedicated to make sure that the Bay Area continues to be a leader in planning for the future.

EXECUTIVE BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

2008 has been both rewarding and challenging for ABAG and its member counties and cities. The state budget crisis and the national economy have both had impacts on the region.

As difficult as it has been, ABAG, as usual, has attempted to bring to our membership programs

and services that support our efforts to improve the quality of life for our residents.

During 2008, ABAG convened two General Assemblies that drew large numbers of elected officials, staff and civic leaders from throughout the region. Upon my recommendation, the ABAG Executive Board authorized a Youth Gun Violence Task Force that has been meeting since September to identify steps that we as local government leaders can take to curb the rising incidence of youth gun violence. We have been fortunate to receive pro bono support from the Legal Community Against Violence. They have agreed to assist us in reviewing and evaluating legislative proposals currently under consideration, work on drafting legislation and testimony, etc. The Task Force will be identifying steps that can be taken locally with ordinances and we will consider a forum on this topic as well as develop a public information campaign. You will hear more about this work as 2009 progresses.

The first of ABAG's two General Assemblies was held in the spring on April 24th in San Francisco. The program highlighted the work that we have been leading on Focused Growth in cooperation with our sister agencies, MTC, the BAAQMD, and BCDC. We also presented our second annual Growing Smarter Together Awards to City of San Leandro (Start it up Category) for its Downtown Transit-Oriented Development Strategy to revitalize their downtown with a walkable, mixed-use housing and business development. The City of **Hercules** (On the Ground—Getting It Done) was recognized for the significant progress that the city has made in implementing its Plan and Regulating Code that has resulted in a high level of public involvement in planning the development, and for guiding development decisions to achieve greater density, mix of uses, walkability, public spaces, and regional transit mobility in Hercules. The City of Dublin, Alameda County Surplus Property Authority, and Bay Area Rapid Transit District (BART)

jointly received the *Public-Private Partnership Award* for their collaboration on the Dublin Transit Center. Their work and partnership creates a significant transit-oriented community in Dublin. Mayor Gwen Regalia, Walnut Creek, received the first *Distinguished Leadership Award*. Each awardee was presented with a plaque in the shape of the region and a copy of a video describing their outstanding work. We owe a special debt of gratitude to Pacific Gas and Electric Company and COMCAST for their sponsorhip and support of the *Growing Smarter Together Awards* Program.

Nominations for the 2009 Awards Program are now being accepted for presentation during the Spring General Assembly. I encourage all of you to nominate projects in your region that demonstrate the excellence that this region is known for throughout the state and country.

During the Business Meeting at the Spring General Assembly, Executive Director Henry Gardner presented a brief summary of ABAG's Strategic Plan, which includes strategies for expanding and improving the service to our members and working on a stable source of funding for the Agency. We need to hear from you about how the Agency is meeting its promise to provide the services and support you have requested. Let us know how we are doing.

ABAG also addressed issues of water and land use in 2008. Water and Land-Use: The Delta Connection was the theme of the Fall General Assembly held in Oakland on October 24th. California State Senate Speaker pro Tem-elect,

Fiscal Year 2009-2010 will be a momentous year for the Association of Bay Area Governments' Planning Programs. ABAG will continue to advance and fine tune an integrated regional planning program that recognizes regional development and conservation priorities and that advances inclusive and collaborative planning at the local level. Working with local jurisdictions and our partner regional agencies, we will support development in existing communities that is



A great region is built from great communities. The FOCUS Initiative, the Bay Area's regional blueprint plan has gained a high level of support among local jurisdictions, regional agencies, and state government since adoption of the first round of Priority Development Areas (PDAs) in 2007. PDA's are transit-served, infill areas where there is an adopted neighborhood-level plan that will accommodate housing in a mixed-use context

or a vision to create such a plan at the local level. There are now approximately 120 PDAs in the Bay area.

It is estimated that the PDAs can accommodate over 50% of the region's

projected housing growth through 2035 based upon existing adopted plans, despite the fact that Priority Development Areas encompass only three percent of the region's land area. During this fiscal year, ABAG, working cooperatively with the Joint Policy Committee and our regional agency partners (the Bay Area Air Quality Management District, Bay Conservation and Development Commission, and MTC), will advance further implementation of FOCUS through our administration of Station Area Planning Grants in 18 Priority Development Areas, the provision of a new technical assistance program, and through an initial call for capital infrastructure projects funded by MTC.

A total of 98 Priority Conservation Areas (PCAs) were adopted by the ABAG Executive Board in 2008. PCAs are areas of regional significance that have broad community support and an urgent need for protection. In 2009 ABAG will work with the State Coastal Conservancy and other land conservation entities including private foundations to secure new funding and direct existing funding to the Priority Conservation Areas.

Well-planned compact development near transit provides water conservation benefits and co-benefits related to reducing negative impacts on water quality and watersheds while creating greener, more sustainable complete communities. FOCUS Priority Development Areas provide the Bay Area with an



compact, transit-oriented, provides for the needs of existing and future residents, and is resource conserving and socially equitable. ABAG will also work collaboratively with public resource agencies, local governments, and the region's open space and water resource entities to identify those scenic and natural resource areas that are the Bay Area's conservation priorities.

SB 375, which was signed into law by Governor Schwarzenegger in 2008, provides a framework for metropolitan planning organizations to address climate change impacts pertaining to land-use and transportation. ABAG and our sister agency, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), are jointly responsible for implementing SB 375 in the Bay Area. In FY2009-2010 our agencies will work together to identify pathways toward meaningful implementation of SB 375 in coordination with local jurisdictions, congestion management agencies, transit providers, and other stakeholder entities.

The sections below provide an overview of ABAG's regional land-use planning initiatives, with descriptions of the agency's issue-based related planning programs following. These programs include efforts related to sustainability through the Bay Area Alliance, earthquake preparedness, green building, water/land use planning, the San Francisco Bay Trail, and the San Francisco Estuary Project.

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opportunity to integrate water conservation strategies with the development of complete communities that bring new vitality to our existing communities and limit sprawl.

Regional Housing Needs

Despite the sharp economic downturn, the San Francisco Bay Area continues to be one of the most expensive housing markets in the United States. High housing costs have put homeownership out of reach for many Bay Area residents who would like to purchase a home and have made finding an affordable apartment a challenge for many more. In Fiscal Year 2009-2010, the Association of Bay Area Governments will address the Bay Area's housing issues on a variety of fronts. Relative to prior Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) cycles, the 2007-2014 RHNA methodology directed an increased share of the region's housing need to jurisdictions with transit infrastructure and employment concentrations. These communities, primarily the region's urban and suburban centers, will be given consideration for incentives related to the FOCUS initiative including housing incentives and capital investments, as well as technical assistance, relative to implementing their share of the region's housing needs. Supporting communities that will play a significant role in addressing the region's

housing needs in a manner that is resource efficient, particularly in relation to climate change, will be a primary issue relative to the development and implementation of SB 375 in the Bay Area.

Regional Planning Committee

The Regional Planning Committee (RPC) is one of the agency's standing committees and encompasses representation from local governments, as well as public agency and non-profit organizations. Organizations represented on the RPC include those with an emphasis on affordable housing, education, environmental protection, the home building industry, and smart growth. The RPC hears issues of regional concern covering a range of planning issues and makes policy recommendations to the ABAG Executive Board. The RPC has an important role to play given ABAG's expanding role in coordinating planning initiatives in the Bay Area.

In 2008, the RPC embarked on a significant effort pertaining to Regional Recovery Planning. Recovery Planning pertains to the period from six months to several years after a major disaster. The RPC has been developing and expanding expertise from a policy perspective on important issues that will need to be addressed following a major event. This is

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in preparation for the RPC's role as the Regional Recovery Planning body for the Bay Area. Given the prediction that the Hayward Fault will experience a major seismic event in the relative near term, the RPC's work on recovery planning is very important and will be further advanced in 2009.

Clearinghouse

ABAG provides information to public and private agencies and the public related to public capital improvement projects and their potential environmental impacts. In 2006, ABAG streamlined the operation of the clearinghouse to provide improved access to and distribution of public review documents.

Regional Airport Planning Commission

The Regional Airport Planning Commission (RAPC) is a joint committee of ABAG, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, and the Bay Conservation and Development Commission. It oversees preparation of the Regional Airport Systems Analysis, which then

becomes part of the Regional Transportation Plan. RAPC also provides a forum for discussion of land use, non-air transportation, and environmental issues related to airports.

Intergovernmental Coordination

In Fiscal Year 2009-2010, coordination between the ABAG Planning Program and our regional agency partners, as well as local governments, will reach unprecedented new levels. As incentive packages for priority areas related to development and conservation are implemented, the role of ABAG's Planning Program as a lead coordinating entity in the Bay Area will continue to expand. As initial work commences to develop the SB 375 Sustainable Communities Strategy, inter-agency collaboration will be necessary on levels beyond the significant advances of recent years. In addition, ABAG's Planning Program provides staff support for a broad range of regional planning-related organizations including ABAG's Homelessness Task Force and the Bay Area Planning Directors' Association.

- ABAG will continue to advance and fine tune an integrated regional planning program that recognizes regional development and conservation priorities and that advances inclusive and collaborative planning at the local level.
- ABAG will also work collaboratively with public resource agencies, local governments, and the region's open space entities to identify those scenic and natural resource areas that are the Bay Area's conservation priorities.
- ABAG and MTC will work together to identify pathways toward meaningful implementation of SB 375 in coordination with local jurisdictions, congestion management agencies, transit providers, and other stakeholder entities.

FOCUS

- ABAG will work with the state government, our regional agency partners, and the nonprofit community to identify and provide for an expanding range of incentives for development in priority areas.
- Incentives will be provided on a competitive basis to jurisdictions that seek to advance and prioritize development in areas that are served by public transit, and that provide proximity to employment centers.
- ABAG will work cooperatively with state resource agencies, local governments, and regional open space entities to protect the region's priority conservation areas.

Regional Housing Needs

ABAG will continue to advance efforts to link regional housing needs with housing development incentives and regional infrastructure investments. Specific actions

will include the following:

- Providing incentives and technical assistance for development in priority development areas.
- Writing and publishing an annual Housing Report to highlight regional issues, identify regional needs, and provide examples of best practices.
- Holding an annual Housing Conference to highlight regional trends and local progress on housing implementation and to provide information on housing incentives and best practices.

Regional Planning Committee

- The RPC will address and make policy recommendations to the Executive Board pertaining to important regional planning issues including considerations relative to areas in the region prioritized for development and for conservation as well as related issues pertaining to potential incentives for priority areas.
- The RPC will make significant advances relative to its roles as the Regional Recovery Planning body for the Bay Area.

Clearinghouse

ABAG will continue its clearinghouse functions including tracking of public projects to allow review and discussion of regionally significant projects.

Regional Airport Planning Commission ABAG will staff and provide leadership to advance RAPC's work program.

Intergovernmental Coordination

ABAG planning staff will expand upon previous efforts to advance the agency's leadership role in coordinating regional planning initiatives in the Bay Area.

ABAG represents Bay Area cities, towns, and counties on the Steering Committee of the Bay Area Alliance for Sustainable Communities (Bay Area Alliance). Members include public and private sector leaders who are committed to ensuring a more sustainable future. Since 1997, the Bay Area Alliance has served as a forum where members can share information and advocate for comprehensive approaches to the region's most significant challenges.

The coalition authored the *Compact for a Sustainable Bay Area*, which recommends strategies for preserving and protecting the natural environment, fostering a robust economy, and providing equitable opportunities to all residents. These strategies include improving the supply and affordability of housing; promoting a comprehensive multimodal transportation system; preserving and revitalizing neighborhoods; and restoring and protecting the region's natural assets. To demonstrate the sustainable practices of communities and organizations throughout the Bay Area, the Bay Area Alliance has published six installments of *Faces of Sustainability*,

highlighting practices in San Francisco and in Alameda, Marin, Napa, San Mateo, and Santa Clara Counties. The Bay Area Alliance also produced *Building Communities We Care About*, a compelling video that features the personal stories of people who are living in successful transit-oriented developments in a number of Bay Area cities. HAZARDOUS WASTE ALLOCATION / BAY AREA GREEN BUSINESS PROGRAM

Since its inception more than 15 years ago, the Hazardous Waste Management Facility Allocation Committee (http://www.abag.ca.gov/hazwaste/) has directed the development of innovative programs that protect the environment. Working in partnership with regional and state agencies, the Committee developed and oversees the implementation of a "fair-share" facility allocation process, initiated and coordinates the Bay Area Green Business Program, and identifies opportunities to take action on critical pollution prevention issues.

ABAG analyzes and reports on the hazardous wastes generated in the region, and develops source reduction recommendations for Committee review. This process tracks waste generation trends, and identifies new opportunities for collaborative action to reduce the amount and fundamentally change the way we deal with hazardous wastes.

The Committee supports local and statewide efforts to promote Extended Producer Responsibility, which would shift the responsibility for reusing, recycling, or disposing of hazardous household and business products such as batteries, fluorescent tubes, pharmaceuticals, computers and televisions, away from local governments and back to manufacturers. The Committee also participates in the Department of Toxic Substances Control's Green Chemistry Initiative, by promoting Environmentally Preferable Purchasing to ABAG members.

To reward environmentally-responsible business practices, in 1996 the Committee launched the Bay Area Green Business Program (www.greenbiz.ca.gov). This award-winning Program offers free assistance and recognizes small businesses that comply with environmental laws and voluntarily implement dozens of additional measures to prevent pollution, conserve resources, and reduce waste. Over 1,500 businesses and public agencies have been certified in the nine Bay Area counties. The Program has expanded statewide, and has become a model for programs elsewhere in the country.

- Monitor and support legislative and other efforts to implement Extended Producer Responsibility for universal wastes.
- Support Cal EPA Department of Toxic Substances Control's Green Chemistry Initiative to promote Environmentally Preferable Purchasing and "green" product design.
- Increase the number of certified green businesses in the Bay Area to 2,000.
- Implement a web-based measurement system to track the environmental benefits of Green Business participation.
- Convert Green Business listings to a searchable database that will make it easier for Bay Area residents and businesses to find certified Green Businesses.

In 2009, the Bay Trail will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Bay Trail Plan. Regional collaboration has resulted in the completion of nearly 300 of the planned 500 miles of recreational and alternative commute trails around the Bay. All cities and counties the trail passes through support this monumental endeavor. Park and open space districts, transit agencies, bicycle coalitions, and public works departments have joined forces to complete this spectacular vision of a "ring around the bay."

As the Bay Trail comes together segment by segment, these shoreline communities are rediscovering their waterfronts through the creation of new parks and destination areas close to the bay. By providing opportunities for healthy lifestyles, shoreline recreation, and bicycle and pedestrian corridors in combination with compact housing development and connections to transit, these communities along the Bay Trail are investing in a sustainable future.

The vision of the San Francisco Bay Trail is a continuous 500-mile shoreline path along the edge of San Francisco Bay that will form a trail system crossing seven toll bridges and connecting nine counties, 47 shoreline cities, and over 130 local, regional and state parks. The Association of Bay Area Governments administers the Bay Trail Project that plans,

promotes, and advocates for implementation. Project staff provides regional oversight and coordination, technical assistance, education and outreach, and seeks funding for planning, design, construction, and maintenance.

The Bay Trail Project accomplished several major tasks in 2008: an additional \$3 million was authorized from Proposition 84 bringing the current grant program to \$6 million for Bay Trail planning and construction projects throughout the region; the project received an increased grant award of \$175,000 from MTC's bridge toll funds and \$60,000 from ABAG for administration of the project; a \$100,000 grant from the Goldman Fund was secured in coordination with the Bay Area Ridge Trail Council to move forward with completing the Carquinez Strait Scenic Loop Trail; staff initiated the Regional Sign Installation Plan to identify locations for new signs along completed sections of the Bay Trail; and the Bay Trail's landmark wildlife and public access study was published in the Journal of Wildlife Management.

In Fiscal Year 2009-10 the San Francisco Bay Trail will:

- In partnership with the Coastal Conservancy, solicit, review and award grants to local jurisdictions for planning, design and construction of Bay Trail segments under the \$6 million grant program provided through Proposition 84.
- Administer awarded Bay Trail planning, design and construction grant contracts.
- Continue to update and use the Gap Analysis Study data to identify and initiate new spending opportunities and new Bay Trail grants.
- Pursue short and long-term funding strategies for project administration, trail development, and maintenance.
- Finalize opportunities for new Bay Trail segments through continued participation in the South Bay Salt Pond Restoration Planning Process.
- Continue to work with ABAG's FOCUS program and the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's Regional Transportation Plan to highlight trails as components of a sustainable region and a regional transportation system.
- Advocate for bicycle and pedestrian access to and across Bay Area toll bridges, including the west span of the Bay Bridge and the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge as well as safe and seamless connections to the Carquinez, Benicia-Martinez, and East Span Bay bridges.
- Complete the installation of Bay Trail signs along all complete sections of the Bay Trail.
- Actively work with partners to recognize the Bay Trail 20th Anniversary with a series of events to celebrate the many ways to enjoy the edge of the shoreline.
- Update the Bay Trail website to create a valuable resource for regional partners and the public about progress of the Bay Trail.
- Publish the *Bay Trail Rider* newsletter; meet regularly with elected officials, agency and local government staff and media contacts; and plan and host trail dedications and other public events.

The San Francisco Estuary Project and its partners completed many projects and activities in 2008 that support the Project's mandate to protect, enhance, and restore the San Francisco Bay-Delta Estuary through implementation of actions in the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP). Continuing the important work of the recent past when the Project completed a comprehensive review and update of the 1993 CCMP, we initiated a Strategic Planning review. The strategic planning objective was to refine our efforts and direct attention to the top regional environmental priorities facing the Estuary.

The Project ably supported the highly successful Fifth Biennial CalFed Science Conference held in October 2008, attended by over 1200 managers and scientists. The Project is managing over 30 grants and contracts totaling over \$20 million directed at reducing pollutants, improving stream protections, decreasing watershed erosion, improving subtidal habitats of the Bay, improving stormwater quality, increasing the function and extent of bay wetlands, and improving public understanding of Clean Water Act issues.

2008 technical and scientific research projects included:

Completed projects:

- Brake Pad Partnership: a multi-year grant to determine impacts on water quality due to Copper in automobile brake pads and stormwater.
- Prism Tools Project: development of a specific procedure to allow labs that do toxicity testing to make a strong link to pyrethroid insecticides— proved to be quite important for identifying pyrethroid-related toxicity across California.

 IPM Contracting Tool Kit: developed a contract tool kit for local government to use in obtaining Integrated Pest Management services.

Continuing projects:

- The multi-year project to develop recommendations to reduce methyl mercury in the Bay Area wetlands
- A project focused on developing methods to reduce methyl mercury and low dissolved oxygen in Suisun Marsh
- Work with the Regional Water Quality Control Boards (RWQCB-San Francisco Bay and North Coast) and other partners, to complete a stream and wetland protection policy for the two regions
- With partners, work to prevent the introduction and spread of invasive species to the Estuary
- Technical support services to the Santa Clara Valley Water District, Alameda County Flood Control Program, Caltrans, and the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission
 Technical and communication assistance to the RWQCB including administration of a multi-year \$2.6 million project for implementation of Total Maximum Daily Loads (limiting pollutants into waterways of the state), and oversight of environmental projects mandated as part of the RWQCB's Administrative Civil Liability fines
- Outreach/education through the Boater Education Program, publication of *Estuary* newsletter, and organizing erosion control workshops.

In Fiscal Year 2009-10 the San Francisco Estuary Project will:

In keeping with this year's ABAG Budget Theme of "The Challenges of Change," continue to focus efforts on projects that help to restore and protect our natural resources while seeking to make our estuarine environments more resilient to the pending changes from climate change. The Project will manage over 20 new onthe-ground projects which together will improve the estuary's wetlands, wildlife habitat, water use efficiency, science for decision-making, and public understanding of the issues and opportunities facing our estuarine environment. View a description of these projects at www.sfestuary.org. In addition to the on-going projects listed above that will continue through the next year, the Project will be:

- Organizing and presenting the ninth biennial State of the Estuary Conference in September with over 800 expected attendees;
- Working with the Urban Pesticide Committee to reduce pesticide use in urban creeks;
- Writing/publishing the 2010 State of the Estuary Report;
- Working with partners, developing the application of the State's Watershed
 Assessment Framework as a tool for integrating and communicating watershed
 health indicators for the San Francisco Estuary, as part of the CALFED Bay-Delta
 Program;
- Working with BCDC, the California Coastal Conservancy, and NOAA on the San Francisco Bay Subtidal Habitat Goals Project, a collaborative interagency effort to establish a comprehensive and long-term management vision for protection, restoration, and appropriate use of San Francisco Bay Subtidal habitats;
- Implementing LID stormwater and flood protection projects in the West Coast Estuaries Initiative grant including wetland restoration in City of Hercules, stream restoration in City of Pinole, monitoring replacement of impermeable pavement in San Mateo County and training students in wetland restoration; and
- Initiating work on 17 local projects across the estuary through \$5 million in grant funds recently awarded by the US EPA.

EARTHQUAKE AND HAZARD MITIGATION AND RECOVERY

Natural disasters come from many sources in the Bay Area and include various earthquakerelated hazards such as ground shaking, liquefaction, landsliding, fault surface rupture, and tsunamis. The Bay Area is also subject to various weather-related hazards including wildfires, floods, landslides, and drought.

Disaster planning encompasses hazard mitigation, disaster response, and disaster recovery. ABAG focuses on mitigation and recovery planning.

ABAG's Hazard Mitigation initiatives have focused on four efforts during the 2008-2009 fiscal year:

- Encouraging quality seismic retrofits of single-family homes through (1) promoting use of the "Standard Plan Set A" developed by a number of professional organizations and ABAG, as well as (2) redoing ABAG's contractor training program.
- Working with a variety of groups to consolidate the assessment of the hazard of "soft-story" multifamily residential buildings, developing innovative approaches for mitigation, and implementing these mitigation strategies in a project funded, in part, by FEMA.

- Assessing the issues related to water system vulnerability, including pipelines and the interaction with sewage systems in a project funded, in part, by FEMA, and using resources of the Sewer Smart program at ABAG.
- Updating the multi-jurisdictional Local Hazard Mitigation Plan for the San Francisco Bay Area, including working with cities and counties to ensure that the revised plan incorporates the findings of the disaster recovery initiatives.

ABAG's Disaster Recovery initiative has focused on three efforts during the 2008-2009 fiscal year:

- Continuing with discussion and training of the Regional Planning Committee on issues related to disaster recovery.
- Investigating the best mechanism to ensure that RPC has an active role in disaster recovery after future Bay Area disasters.
- Developing of a model disaster recovery plan, using the City of Oakland as a pilot project funded, in part, by the City of Oakland.

While the Research Department continues to be involved in a number of projects, in 2008 and 2009 the focus has been and will be the Projections 2009 forecast and its long term implications for land use planning. Substantial improvements have been made to the forecasting method and process. These improvements anticipate changes in regional planning that are called for in recently passed legislation, SB 375. For example, the Executive Board adopted a set of performance targets that are consistent with targets the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is using for its current Regional Transportation Plan. The specific regional performance targets for Projections 2009 are to accomplish the following, by 2035:

- Reduce driving per person by 10 percent below today's levels.
- Reduce traffic congestion, measured by hours of delay, by 20 percent below today's levels.
- Reduce carbon dioxide emissions by 40 percent below 1990 levels.
- Reduce particulate matter (PM) PM2.5 (fine dust particles) emissions by 10 percent below today's levels.
- Reduce PM10 (coarser particulate matter) by 45 percent below today's levels.
- Limit greenfield development to 900 acres per year over the next 25 years.
- Increase access to jobs and essential services via transit or walking by 20 percent above today's levels.

To facilitate dialogue with local governments about the future of the Bay Area, we have created two alternative development scenarios called Scattered Success and Focused Future. In the first scenario, Scattered Success, local and regional policy makers have had some success in developing more transportation-efficient projects. Still, thousands of additional acres of low-density, auto-dependent, single-use neighborhoods have been added to our urban footprint. Transit is still unavailable in many parts of the region and walking remains an unrealistic option in too many places. This means the majority of us continue to drive to our daily destinations. As a result, driving and transportation-related carbon emissions have gone up.

In the second scenario, Focused Future, there has been an incredible amount of region-wide revitalization of inner cities and new development around light- and heavy-rail stations, major bus stops and ferry terminals. Transportation services have been extended and improved, and many connections are nearly seamless. Existing, auto-dependent suburbs have been transformed into walkable downtowns and mixed-use neighborhoods, where more housing and businesses have located. Walking, biking, and transit use are the norm in many places. As a result, transportation-related carbon emissions have gone down.

ABAG's staff has worked closely with MTC staff to evaluate the impacts of these land use patterns on not only the carbon emission target, but many of the other performance targets as well. MTC will be assisting us with further modeling as we finalize *Projections* 2009.

Much like the requirements detailed in SB 375, we have also conducted extensive outreach around the region. We also encouraged formal written comments from local jurisdictions. A combined scenario will be produced in early 2009 that incorporates these comments and the analysis from our earlier scenarios. We expect to ask the Executive Board for approval of the forecast at its March 2009 meeting.

Implications of SB 375 and the Sustainable Communities Strategy

It is important to recognize that the changes envisioned by SB 375 are potentially far reaching, and have already generated a great deal of interest across the region. As we complete the Projections Forecast in early 2009 we will be transitioning to work on the SB 375 process, specifically on the Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) that it calls for. The SCS will replace the *Projections Forecast* as an input into the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP); nevertheless, the SCS remains a forecast of land use, though a more extensive one. The SCS is intended to have greater interaction with the transportation scenarios that are considered in the RTP. Additional outreach will be required, done much earlier in the process than historically undertaken in past outreach efforts. ABAG and MTC staff will need to work jointly on policy, outreach, and technical issues.

We have already begun discussions with local governments about SB 375 and the Sustainable Communities Strategy because of its similarity to our *Projections 2009* process. We intend to

continue that discussion in various ways throughout 2009 and 2010. Working with our regional partners, we will need to reach out to local jurisdictions, county congestion management agencies, nongovernmental organizations, and the general public. While state legislation appropriately focuses on greenhouse gas reduction, the SCS will promote a broader set of goals similar to the performance targets already adopted by ABAG and MTC.

The outreach on *Projections 2009* has generated and/or reinforced a number of broad policy issues that we need to explore. These issues include: the need to match resources, particularly infrastructure resources to areas expected to see growth; consideration of jobs housing balance; equity in responding to regional growth; and the impact of land use patterns on a variety of local and regional issues like water use, school enrollment, and crime.

SB 375 will transform our forecasting work. During 2009, ABAG and MTC will be working with the California Air Resources Board on setting a greenhouse gas target for our region. The factors considered and the methodologies used will be important to encourage greenhouse gas reductions in our region.

The implementation of SB 375 will also require new levels of cooperation between ABAG and MTC staff at a technical level. Models will be key tools in developing and assessing alternative land use and transportation strategies. Both agencies will be working on replacing and upgrading current computer models used. We will be insuring that those models interface and staff are able to work together to produce the information needed by decision makers and the public during the development of the SCS.

- Develop SB 375 Regional Targets and SB 375 Workplan and Outreach
- · Conduct PECAS Modeling Work
- · Produce the Annual Housing Report
- Develop and Present the Bay Area's 21st annual Short Term Economic Forecast.

ABAG Publicly Owned Energy Resources (ABAG POWER) is a joint powers agency (JPA) formed by ABAG to acquire energy on behalf of local governments, as well as provide energy management and telecommunication services. ABAG POWER currently offers natural gas aggregation to 38 local governments and special districts in the Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) service territory. ABAG POWER provides a public sector approach to pooled purchasing, and each public agency is guaranteed a voice in program operations and decisions through its representative to the ABAG POWER Board of Directors and Executive Committee. ABAG and ABAG POWER are also working to expand their energy conservation services to local jurisdictions through implementation of energy efficiency and energy management programs.

Gas Aggregation Program

The natural gas purchasing pool has now completed its eleventh year of operation. ABAG POWER purchases natural gas on behalf of members and arranges for it to be delivered to the PG&E system for distribution. The goal of ABAG POWER's Natural Gas Program is to provide both cost savings and price stability. These goals differ from that of PG&E which is incentivized to provide low cost gas on a near-term (monthly) basis. ABAG POWER stabilizes its gas prices by layering in longer-term gas purchases, with the alternate objective of diversifying its gas purchase portfolio. The Program uses a continuous three year ahead planning cycle to design its purchasing strategy.

In recent months natural gas prices have fallen precipitously from the highs seen during the summer of 2008. The reasons for this decline are varied; however, one main aspect is the

overall down-turn in the world economic situation. While prices are now expected to remain at a relative low level for the near future, price volatility remains a significant risk. There are many factors that can cause significant price volatility, including: abnormal weather patterns, increased demand from gaspowered electric generators, restrictions in gas transportation capacity and/or imports, the price of oil, regulatory actions, and political instability. Recently the first Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) terminal on the West Coast (Northern Mexico) became operational, potentially putting a small downward pressure on prices. However, an increased focus on environmental issues may cause regulatory actions that produce increased costs for using petroleum products, including natural gas.

ABAG Energy Watch

Since mid-2006, ABAG has been implementing the ABAG Energy Watch program. This is a partnership program with PG&E, and is designed to assist local governments achieve energy and cost savings by improving energy efficiency in public facilities, and assist in creating community-wide energy savings through energy policies and programs. To date, 70 cities, counties, and special districts in the ABAG region have "enrolled" in the program to receive assistance. While the program was originally scheduled to end in December 2008, ABAG has negotiated additional funding in order to complete additional projects during the first few months of 2009. Later in 2009, ABAG expects to transition the program to providing assistance under the new "Green Communities" program being developed by PG&E. This program will help local governments implement their Climate Action efforts.

In Fiscal Year 2009-10 ABAG POWER will:

- Continue to provide cost effective natural gas aggregation and delivery services for local governmental agencies. This will include active solicitations among natural gas marketers, and the addition of new gas suppliers, as necessary, to continue receiving the most competitive pricing. The program will pursue longer-term fixed price gas products in order to stabilize program costs.
- The Program will look for additional ways of improving the customer service aspects of the program, in particular with respect to billing and analysis functions. The ABAG POWER Board recently approved funding for a pilot project that will enhance the program's ability to provide additional energy data analysis.
- Although ABAG POWER primarily supplies natural gas to smaller "core" customers, it also implements a "noncore" program to supply larger facilities.
 Qualified, noncore customers can take advantage of lower gas transportation rates that are not available to PG&E customers. ABAG POWER currently supplies gas to three noncore facilities (City of Santa Rosa, City of Watsonville, County of San Mateo). We will continue to encourage additional participants in both the core and noncore programs.

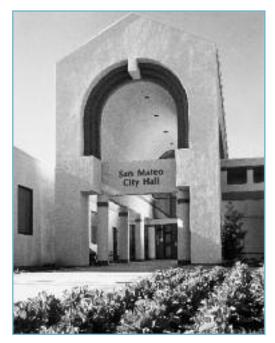

Since 1985, a time of change brought on by the lack of affordable insurance, ABAG has worked with its members to create and sustain risk management and insurance services for local governments. We have turned a crisis situation into a success story, promoting positive change that has resulted in more flexible, affordable, and efficient coverage to sustain activities considered too risky by the insurance industry and expand into new services, such as skate and swim parks, member local governments didn't have before.

The results have been impressive, with ABAG PLAN Corporation providing property, liability, and crime coverage to 31 cities and towns in the Bay Area for more than 20 years. Over that time, ABAG PLAN has grown to exceed \$50 million in assets, return over \$20 million in dividends, and save its members over \$70 million in premiums. In addition, the SHARP pool has been providing affordable Workers Compensation coverage to member cities by pooling losses up to \$250,000 and purchasing pooled coverage and reinsurance for larger losses.

ABAG PLAN's success has enabled members to promote positive change in their organizations by providing grants for improving their risk management programs, including sidewalks,

These Programs have helped ABAG members to provide for construction of new hospitals and medical clinics, transit systems, affordable housing, schools, museums, water and wastewater systems, and other member-owned infrastructure. The ABAG Financial Services (Agency) has placed special focus on assisting in the construction and preservation of affordable multifamily housing, providing financing for more than 10,000 units in more than seventy affordable apartment

communities. These programs present convenient, cost saving, and secure means to meet the broad array of capital financing needs of public agencies and their nonprofit partners serving the public interest.

The Agency will also continue to offer the California Redevelopment Agency Pool (Cal-Rap), its industry leading tax-allocation bond product as well as its credit-enhanced, pooled financing vehicle for Water and Wastewater Districts. The ABAG Training Center (a program of ABAG, Inc.) has been an ABAG service program since 1979, created to provide economical alternatives for local government employees to obtain professional development training. Early course offerings were in the fields of management, environmental planning, housing, and computer technology and were held in classrooms at our facility and elsewhere. Through the years, the training needs of our members and clients have changed. Today, our courses focus on safety training required by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and the Department of Transportation (DOT). These courses reach students in the Bay Area and around the world through our webbased identity, www.hazmatschool.com.

Increasing our client base provides a means to support the continued training of our members' employees at a reduced price, and hazmatschool.com has been very successful at achieving this goal. Enrollment and revenues for the online school are consistently increasing. More than 7,000 students receive training through hazmatschool.com each year.

The market for online safety training is maturing, and the thresholds for entry by new organizations have become higher. ABAG's early entry has allowed us to develop a strong catalog of courses, a good reputation, and capable student management and course enrollment and delivery systems. We have forged a partnership with Safety Compliance Management Inc. (SCM) of San Ramon, which continues to work well. SCM provides expert course content and Remote Instructors™ who are easily accessible to online students. We have also taken steps to affiliate ourselves with important organizations, such as the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) and the International Association for Continuing Education and Training (IACET).

Throughout Fiscal Year 2008-09 we have continued the practice of refreshing course material to keep it up to date and performing small technical changes to make the training experience easier for users as well as their supervisors and corporate training coordinators.

Advocating Policies Linking Land Use, Transportation and Climate Change

Recognizing the power and regional impact of focused integrated planning and environmentally healthy communities, ABAG's Legislation and Governmental Organization Committee (L&GO) set legislative priorities for 2008 that they will continue to pursue in FY 2009-10. These priorities include the pursuit of resources and incentives for planning, infrastructure and services to assist local governments and related climate change land use solutions. Bills reflecting recommendations from ABAG Youth Gun Violence Task Force and the Long Term Financial Disaster Recovery Planning Initiative will be added to critical regional priorities tracked during the 2009 California legislative session.

An important part of legislative outreach in 2008 has focused on briefing legislators and weighing in with regional priorities and innovative solutions early in the bill process. This will continue in 2009 which begins the next two-year legislative cycle.

The Committee, which is composed of elected officials from throughout the region, considered 32 state bills during the past 2008 session. Twelve of these bills became law and four were vetoed. The legislation considered reflected the legislative priorities set by the Committee: local planning, transit-oriented, infill and redevelopment issues; transportationland use planning and sustainable communities strategy; regional blueprint funding needs as well as community development, planning and transportation fees; establishment of the San Francisco Bay Restoration Authority and integrated regional water management planning; hazard mitigation, seismic safety building standards, and creation of the California Emergency Management Agency; a collection program for mercury-added thermostats; green building, climate change policies, and renewable energy; local government meeting policies and formalizing BCDC membership in the Joint Policy Committee.

In 2008, ABAG's outreach efforts emphasized the critical role that the participation of local governments and other stakeholders plays in ABAG planning initiatives and services. They were recognized for their achievements in planning and building transit-oriented development, revitalizing their communities, and promoting community partnerships while preserving and protecting the environment. Gwen Regalia, Walnut Creek Mayor and past ABAG President, was awarded the first Distinguished Leader Award for her public service career and unsurpassed commitment to sustainable community improvement and focused smart growth on the local, regional and state level. The best practice efforts of these awardees were documented in a special DVD which can be viewed on ABAG's website at www.abag.ca.gov.

The Fall General Assembly, "Regional Water-Land Use Planning: the Delta Connection," added a water-land use dimension to communication strategies and outreach. Incorporating state, regional, and local official policy expertise in water-land use sustainability, the regional forum provided a platform to discuss infrastructure, emerging development, sustainability, water supply and quality, Delta

emergency management, and the ongoing need for an integrated water-land use regional plan.

Media outreach for the General Assemblies, conferences, and other significant projects included press briefings, releases, and interviews on short term economic trends, long-term disaster recovery planning, regional housing issues, regional housing needs allocation process, priority development and priority conservation areas, green business, and risk management issues like sewer back-up and backflow prevention. Increased coverage of ABAG programs and services in the media was coordinated by the Communications team to provide in-person analysis of regional issues and local government priorities, featuring press interviews with policymakers, ABAG staff, and Executive Board members. These visibility strategies included kicking off a climate protection campaign and the distribution of thousands of reusable grocery bags, "A bag from ABAG," to demonstrate best practices for reducing our regional carbon footprint and how simple steps taken by local governments and community members can make a difference.

SUMMARY OF REVENUES AND EXPENSES BY PROGRAM GROUP

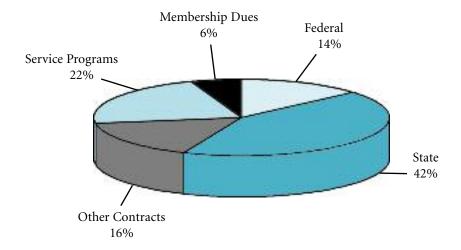

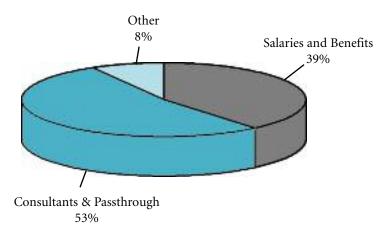

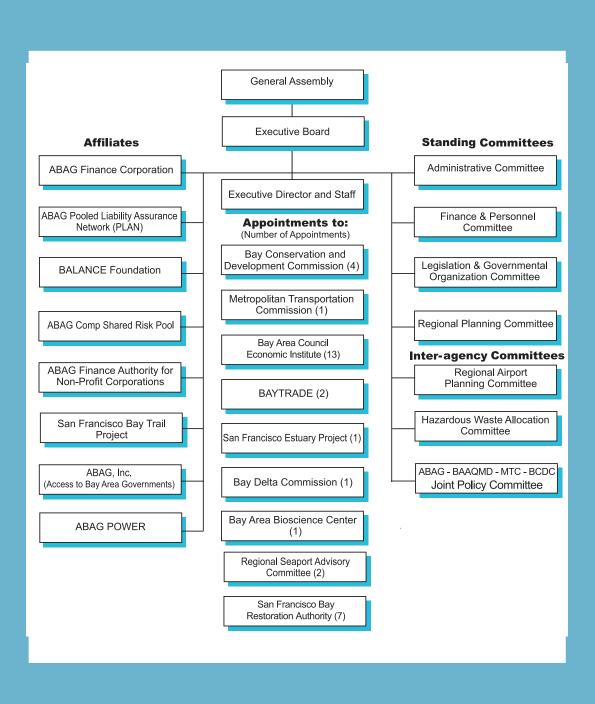

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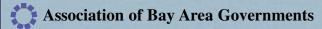
